Green Thumbs UP

We expanded our green roof garden on top of Daniels Spectrum to 1,600 sq ft of growing space, including four vegetable beds, two native flower patches, one sunflower patch (which grew over 12 ft tall!), a Three Sisters garden, and a medicine garden.

We grew over 400lbs of produce, which was over 1,200 units of produce brought to the Cabbagetown market or donated to local organization Mothers of Peace. The development of the green roof garden was

generously funded by the Investment Readiness Program of the Toronto Community Foundation.

Program Highlights

We returned to the Allan Gardens Children's Conservatory this spring after a Covid hiatus, where classes got to start their own seeds in the greenhouse and learn all about how plants grow.

We introduced new programming for Indigenous Peoples Day in June, including storytelling, braiding Sweetgrass, and planting a Three Sisters garden.

We continued our Trees From Seed program, with new or expanded tree nursery locations at all of our school garden sites. We even got to try Pawpaw popsicles while planting our own Pawpaw seeds! Thanks to the City of Toronto's Urban Forestry Department!

Our Urban Roots Youth after-school program's spring and fall cohorts helped with seed starting, garden prep, planting, harvesting, seed saving, cooking, garden crafts and more.

To sum it all up with a quote from one of our participants: "I can't wait to be back next year!"

School Gardens Land Back

This year, we increased our offerings to include a daytime training program, enabling parents and community members to start or meaningfully contribute to school gardens in their own neighbourhoods. Thanks to a grant from the Community Recovery Fund of Canadian Red Cross, this program is offered free of charge!

Here's what one of our participants had to say:

"This program offers a deep dive into how to design, cultivate, sustain, and support a school garden. Through workshop sessions, hands-on learning, and mentorship, the program brings together Indigenous-led discussions and stories on caretaking the land, technical information and insight into the material resources needed to get a school garden up and running, as well as curricular activities on nature and environment that centre the school garden as a welcoming and essential learning space for children. I come away from each session newly inspired."
