# **PROGRAMS**

### **Kids Growing**

Children's exploration of nature and fresh food is at the heart of this program. Gardening and food activities on school grounds and in the classroom support curriculum objectives and provide healthy summer activities for young children. Programs take place at our partner schools, Nelson Mandela Park, Sprucecourt PS, and Winchester Junior & Senior PS, as well as in Allan Gardens Greenhouse.

### Cook & Grow

In this well-received after-school project, an average of 12 elementary students in 16 sessions at Nelson Mandela Park and 19 sessions at Winchester Junior & Senior Public Schools, explored the connection between food production and food preparation/ consumption. By working together in school gardens and kitchens, students enhanced their emotional and social skills while learning about growing plants and using them to make a meal.

### **Urban Trees from Seed**

Students participating in this project collected, saved and grew native tree seeds found in their communities. The seeds were planted in tree nurseries on school grounds and will be remain there until they are ready to be replanted in the community. Through this work students help to increase the city tree canopy, improve air quality and provide habitats for pollinators. This project teaches



# Spring is in the Air

Our annual event at the beautiful Allan Gardens Children's Conservatory brought families together for a spring plant sale, children's activities, refreshments and outdoor live entertainment. A celebration of community, supporters, and spring!

### **New Roots Dinner Series**

In October, the New Roots Dinner Series, sponsored by Daniel et Daniel Catering and Events celebrated Green Thumbs, community, and the harvest season as over 100 people dined in six local Cabbagetown venues. Enticing menus were created by awardwinning chefs at Daniel et Daniel and incorporated ingredients grown in our very own Green Thumbs gardens.

### **Urban Roots Youth**

This after school program engaged an average of four youth weekly during the growing season who had an interest in food, the environment and urban agriculture.

This year, students learned and practiced agriculture techniques from early spring seed preparation in greenhouses, to readying school gardens for planting, caring for the gardens throughout the growing season, through to harvesting the fruits and vegetables.

By participating regularly in community farmers markets, youth learned about harvesting produce for sale, skills required in market vending and boosted their communication and customer service skills. The Regent Park Good Food and Cabbagetown Farmers markets were a fantastic place to meet neighbours and connect with community groups as the youth proudly displayed produce grown in local schools with the help of students, teachers, and community volunteers.

Youth were active participants in an intergenerational garden plot, where they worked with an average of 8 gardening enthusiasts from a local seniors' residence to grow a medicinal garden in Regent Park Community Garden, over four sessions.
